With admiration and gratitude, we remember Ros as a visionary leader whose dedication to championing causes and supporting West Australians with breast cancer has left a significant mark on our community.

In 2000, Ros established BCCWA, drawing from her personal experiences with chronic breast disease, including a mastectomy at the age of 34. Over the years, BCCWA has evolved from grassroots support into one of Western Australia's most successful charities, raising over \$40 million to assist thousands of West Australians facing breast cancer and their families.

BCCWA understands Ros's personal choice regarding Voluntary Assisted Dying (VAD) and her decision to allow a documentary film crew to capture her end-of-life journey following her unexpected lung and brain cancer diagnosis in July 2024. While we honour her choices, BCCWA remains neutral and committed to supporting our clients as they explore all their healthcare options. We believe in empowering everyone to navigate their decisions and make the best choices for themselves.
